Safety Alert

Recently there was an incident on the lake that could have resulted in tragedy. Five young children attempted to swim across the lake to the islands with only a small inflatable raft. One of the children was only five years old, the others appeared to be under 10 years of age. When the children were overcome with exhaustion they began calling for help. Luckily a resident heard their pleas, jumped in his boat and rescued them.

Several unaccompanied young children have been observed swimming at the main beach, this cannot continue. Hickory Hills Landowners does not employ lifeguards, therefore, it is the responsibility of all parents to ensure the safety of their chil-

Preserve Our Lake By Ken Takvorian

Our lake enhances our daily lives. It provides many recreational activities. It enhances the value of our homes, provides aesthetic values and habitat for wildlife. However, our day-to-day activities near our lake can have detrimental effects.

Our lake is experiencing increasing levels of pollution by sediments, pathogens, and fertilizers that run off and promote algae and aquatic weeds. Weeds in turn can reduce oxygen levels, damage fish populations and also reduce the clarity of the water, which can affect swimming, boating and fishing. Other pollutants of concern are human bacteria, oils, grease and hazardous/toxic materials.

What causes water quality problems? Rainwater that falls on or in the Lunenburg watershed runs through the ground and enters the lake. These sources of water include storm water erosion and sediments from development sites where vegetation has been disturbed, use of fertilizers and pesticides on lawns, and septic system discharges. Our lake receives dog wastes, waste oils, lawn fertilizers/pesticides and anything else we dump in our yards.

We must control the invasion of our lake by in-

vasive aquatic plants. All boats/trailers need to be thoroughly cleaned before they are put into our lake. Invasive aquatic plants are easily spread by fragmentation and if left unchecked will quickly (less than 5 years) take over our lake. This can result in a thick mat of smelly decaying weeds and poor lake quality for boating and swimming. Do your part by looking for and pulling by the root the Purple Loosestrife, bagging it and letting it dry out before discarding. Join the Loosestrife Vigilantes!

A few tips:

- Consider using Eco-Lawn, www.savegree.biz, within 15 feet of the lake. It needs very little watering, no fertilizers and little or no cutting to look beautiful.
- Have our septic system inspected and pumped every two years so that it operates properly.
- Purchase household detergents and cleaners that are low in phosphorus or contain no phosphorus.
- Do not dispose of hazardous wastes in your household septic system.
- Minimize your use of water.

Only we can save our lake for our future generations.

Fireworks Trivia

The Chinese invented gunpowder in the 13th century. Later ancient


Chinese alchemists refined the formula to potassium nitrate, charcoal and sulfur to invent fireworks, which they used in ceremonies to scare away evil spirits. Separately the ingredients are not dangerous; it is when they are mixed together that they become explosive.

Marco Polo brought the fireworks formula from China back to the East in the 13th century. It was in the 14th century that fireworks were first used for pleasure. In the renaissance era the Catholic Church used fireworks to bring a touch of magic to many Saints Day celebrations.

Original colors of fireworks were so pale they were almost nonexistent until the 1830's when Italian alchemists changed the formula from potassium nitrate to potassium chlorate, a more energetic use of oxygen, which boosted the rate of oxygen from 1,700 degrees Celsius to 2,000 degrees Celsius and enhanced the colors. Adding different metal salts to the original gunpowder formula gives us the huge array of colors we see today. For instance, copper produces blue, strontium produces red, barium produces green, etc., and when no salts are added you get white.

In the Elizabethan period fireworks were used as high entertainment, mostly for the upper classes, where usually a dragon that emitted showers of sparks was used as the main entertainment. Fireworks today have become more democratic and are fashioned for everyone.

America's largest and oldest fireworks making company, Zambelli's, an Italian/American company, was located in New Castle, New Jersey




in 1893. Since static electricity or sparks produced by machinery could set off an explosion at any time fireworks are

still made the old fashioned way there; by hand. Even buildings at Zambelli's were constructed with explosive precautions in mind. The walls are extra thick and the roof is weak. If an explosion does occur the blast will go upwards and not outwards.

Once the black powder at the bottom of an aerial mortar is ignited it travels vertically, at about 300 mph, approximately 100 feet for each inch in diameter of the shell, for instance a six-inch shell would travel 600 feet before it exploded and could produce a display 600 feet across the night sky.

Boston's 4th of July celebration, the largest and oldest independence celebration in the United States, which now a days draws nearly a half a million spectators, incorporates mod-

ern day computer technology as well as pyrotechnics to set off the fireworks. Using computers to match the timing of the different types of explosions to the words of a song, such as "Great"



The display, containing approximately three and a half ton of explosive devices and about 5,700 mortars that require individual firings takes a week just to set up, is set off from a barge in the Charles River and is accompanied by music for a grand effect. Although the 1812 overture was written to celebrate the defeat of Napoleon by Russia and has nothing to do with American independence it is the most commonly used music at most firework celebrations.



Are You Contributing to this Problem?

Our shoreline is being eroded...by US!

Residents need to understand that the "NO WAKE" signs are put out for two reasons...to reduce the shoreline erosion, and reduce damage to docks and boats.

If you are driving your boat in the middle of the lake, your boat wake will dissipate before it reaches the shoreline. If you are near the shoreline or in ANY cove your wake will NOT dissipate before it reaches the shoreline and will cause damage.

You must use "HEADWAY SPEED ONLY" in all coves and near the shoreline. To be clear...headway speed means a speed at which your boat leaves "NO WAKE,"

Please obey the NO WAKE areas marked in the coves around the lake. Complaints roll into the office regarding the wake left by boats that speed in and out of the coves. No Wake or Headway Speed Only applies to ALL COVES and signs need to be respected.

Registration of Boats and Motors

All boats and motors must be registered through the office. Boat stickers are \$20.00 for non-shareholders and \$10.00 for shareholders. Boating Guides are available and may be picked up in the office. If your boat is in the water (even in front of your house), it needs a boat sticker.

Security Patrol does issue boat or parking stickers.

Final Notices for 2007 Annual Maintenance Fees

Your 2007 annual maintenance fees were due on May I. We are using the same program as in the past, which will automatically assess interest on any bills that are more than 30 days past due.
